MOVING BLOOMINGTON FORWARD CONNECTING WITH COMMUNITY ON THREE PROJECTS

n November 2023, Bloomington voters approved a new half-percent sales tax to provide \$155 million for the enhancement and protection of the Nine Mile Creek corridor and Moir and Central parks, construction of a new community health and wellness center and renovations to the Bloomington Ice Garden. Project teams have been connecting with community members to inform each of the three projects over the summer. Learn more at bloomingtonforward.org.

NINE MILE CREEK CORRIDOR AND MOIR/CENTRAL PARK RENEWAL

This summer, hundreds of people attended two community events—one to celebrate Nine Mile Creek and the other to help plan Moir Park. Event attendees shared what they love about the Nine Mile Creek corridor area, including Moir and Central parks. One person said: "It feels like we're in the middle of the north woods. I call it the boundary waters of Bloomington." Check out the video at blm.mn/loveninemile.

City staff also hosted a nature and ecology creek walk, and ADA accessibility and bike focus groups. This month, the project team will be developing concepts. Another community event is coming up in October to share high-level concepts and collect feedback. Visit bloomingtonforward.org for details.

elebrate the possibilities of the new community health and wellness center on Saturday, September 28, 4-7 p.m., in the park elebrate the next to Creekside Community Center, 9801 Penn Ave. S. You'll learn more about the new center's possible programs, services and amenities. Attendees will also enjoy live music, food trucks and activities.

Survey results collected in June, stakeholder interviews, previous community center work and focus group feedback informed City staff and HGA Architects as to what kind of programs, services and amenities residents would like to see in the new center.

The new community health and wellness center will support a wide range of recreational and fitness activities and programs. The new center will replace the existing Public Health and Creekside Community Center buildings and be located on the current Creekside site. The end goal is for the new center to open in 2027.

BLOOMINGTON ICE GARDEN

he City is renovating Bloomington Ice Garden, 3600 W. 98th St., which will allow Bloomington athletes and families to enjoy• ice time closer to home, and help the facility host more events that draw visitors from across the region.

JGL Architects and City staff hosted an open house event in July to share more information about the renovation and modernization project with stakeholders. Attendees learned about major components of the project—arena flooring, dasher boards and the new ice system—and viewed concept design plans.

No interruptions to BIG operations are expected as a result of the renovation until mid-March 2025 through fall 2025 when the facility is anticipated to close for construction.

his month, we'll learn which entrepreneur will be named the first-ever Hatch Bloomington winner. I hope you've been following along as attentively as I have, watching the pitches from each contestant as the field has been whittled down from the Top 25 contestants to the Top 10 and now the Top 3. The winner of the Hatch Bloomington pitch contest will receive \$100,000 in assistance to start a brick-and-mortar business in the city. Hatch Bloomington is a partnership with the Minneapolis Regional Chamber.

Seeing all the ideas these inspiring entrepreneurs have pitched has me on the edge of my seat waiting to see who will win the most community support. Whoever it is will be joining good company.

Bloomington's business community has been booming. As I said last month, Bloomington has an attractive business climate. I've been a part of welcoming so many new businesses, big and small, to our city including Luro Boots, TKDA, Waffle Bar, Wilderness Inquiry and more.

The City has been doing directed intentional work for years to promote small businesses and entrepreneurs, and to connect with and support businesses of all sizes in Bloomington. Programs like Welcoming Wednesdays, read more on page 3, Business Connections and Elevate Hennepin have had a positive impact on our business community. The City is also taking steps to protect workers, such as the sick and safe leave ordinance the City Council passed in 2023, before the State adopted a similar law.

The City has previously shared its plans to repurpose the old Fire Station 3, 2050 E. 86th St., to create a small business center. Due to funding challenges, that project has been put on hold. While we may not continue with the brick and mortar small business center project, the City will continue to provide support for small businesses and explore new ways to do so.

One of the goals of the proposed small business center was to enhance access to support small businesses and aspiring entrepreneurs. We'll be taking a big step to support an entrepreneur this month when the Hatch Bloomington winner is announced. Soon, a new brick and mortar business will be on its way to Bloomington, thanks to the creative and energetic entrepreneurs who became contestants to help make the first year of Hatch Bloomington a success. WHAT'S DEVELOPING: GYROPOLIS EXPANSION NEARS COMPLETION

gyropolis, known for its Greek family recipes made with organic produce, is nearing completion of its expansion at 2325 W. 90th St.

The project, which will triple the restaurant's size with a 2,400-square-foot addition, features a new kitchen and adds 74 indoor seats, along with a 58-seat outdoor patio. This project is supported by local initiatives such as Tax Increment Financing (TIF) and a DEED grant of \$58,400. The expansion is expected to be completed by October and will reopen to the public soon after.

HOW TO DISPOSE OF YOUR YARD WASTE

Yard waste collection is a subscription service for residents with City garbage and recycling collection. Weather permitting, full-season yard waste collection runs Monday of the second full week in April through Friday of the last full week of November. If there is significant snowfall before the end of November, yard waste collection will end at that time.

2024 yard waste season runs from Monday, April 8 – Saturday,

Available incentives include rebates from CenterPoint Energy, federal tax credits and low-interest loans from the Center for Energy and Environment. Loans are available through the Bloomington Housing and Redevelopment Authority for income-qualified residents.

YOUTH MENTAL HEALTH IS A PUBLIC HEALTH CRISIS

eptember is National Suicide Prevention Month, and suicide is a leading cause of death in the United States. While anyone can be at risk, people with mental health issues experience a much higher risk of suicide.

ACTION PLAN BRINGS ENHANCEMENTS TO CROSSWALKS

Bloomington is a city of walkers. To meet the needs of pedestrians, the City adopted an Active Transportation Action Plan in December 2023. To advance the goals of the plan, nine crosswalks will see enhancements this year, ranging from curb bump-outs or pedestrian refuge islands to signage with pedestrian activated flashing beacons.

Engineering is also addressing gaps in the sidewalk network. Sidewalk gaps on West 78th Street, west of Normandale, will be filled. Where sidewalks cannot be added along West Bloomington Freeway and lower Lyndale Avenue, a dedicated pedestrian lane or shared bike/pedestrian lane will be added on the roadway.

Lastly, on East 82nd Street between 12th Avenue and Old Cedar Avenue, a utility replacement project will remove much of the road surface and one of the curb lines. The new curb will be added in a location to allow for a boulevard separation between the roadway and sidewalk.

AVOID A TICKET: GET TO KNOW BASIC PARKING RULES


o one wants a parking ticket, and everyone wants to keep our streets safe and vehicles moving. By complying with on-street parking rules, you contribute to Bloomington's economic vitality, livability, safety and sense of well-being for residents, visitors and businesses.

Do your part by following basic parking rules, including no parking:

- On the street for more than 24 consecutive hours.
- Within five feet of a driveway
 or mailbox
- Within 10 feet of a fire hydrant.
- Within 20 feet of a crosswalk at an intersection.
- Within 30 feet upon the approach to any stop sign or traffic-control signal located at the side of a roadway.
- On a public right-of-way within 48 hours after a snow emergency has been declared.

Parking vehicles on a sidewalk is also prohibited. This includes parking on the part of the driveway that overlaps a sidewalk. A blocked sidewalk can be challenging and unsafe for pedestrians.

FIBER OPTIC INSTALLATION LEADS TO MORE OPTIONS FOR HIGH SPEED INTERNET

f you see work being done in front of or along your property line, it could be crews from local broadband providers installing fiber optics in your neighborhood. These installations are expected to continue throughout Bloomington for the next two to five years.

What are fiber optics? Thin flexible fibers of glass or plastic in a cable used to transmit light signals from one end of a cable to the other. These fibers are frequently used in fiber-optic communications, where they permit transmission over longer distances and at higher bandwidths than electrical cables.

Questions? Many residents have had questions about this work, especially around property lines, right-of-way and easements. This work is not being carried out by the City of Bloomington so City staff cannot direct installation crews.

CREWS ARE WORKING ON THE NEW TRETBAUGH AND BRYANT PARKS

round broke on the new Tretbaugh and Bryant park projects in July and August, respectively. Construction is expected to finish by fall 2025.

During construction, there will be limited access to Bryant and Tretbaugh parks. Please do not enter gated construction zones on site for your safety.

When construction is complete, Bryant Park, 1001 W. 85th St., will host the first fully inclusive playground in Bloomington, along with a redesigned park shelter.

The new Tretbaugh Park, 3261 W. 90th St., will be a bike skills park. The reimagined park will feature a paved all-wheel track and a gravel course for mountain bike skills development. There will also be a new shade structure and seating areas.

Based on City forecasts, between now and 2040 an estimated \$55 million in City sanitary sewer improvements will be needed to meet the capacity demand of redevelopment throughout Bloomington. The City seeks your feedback on how best to fund improvements to increase sanitary sewer capacity.




BLOOMINGTON YESTERDAY: SOUTHTOWN CENTER IN 1970

n 1970, a photo was captured near what is now Huntington Bank at the intersection of Penn Avenue South and West 79th Street. This photo shows the entrance of Southtown Center, a Bloomington staple since it opened on November 3, 1960, as the city's first regional shopping center.

Developed by Kraus-Anderson, the center initially featured a large Montgomery Ward store and later added amenities such as the AMF Bowling Center in 1963 and the Mann Theatre in 1964. At the time of the photo, the theater was showing "Song of Norway."

Southtown Center has evolved over the years, replacing the theater with more retail space and adapting to changing trends.

Today, it remains a significant and well-frequented spot for Bloomington residents.

Hanson's interest in public service was inspired by her grandfather, a long-time city councilmember and mayor. "Public service was probably in my DNA!"


In her current role, Hanson oversees elections, business licenses, passport applications and cemetery services. Hanson is also focusing on improving online access to cemetery records.
