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Mayor's memo Honoring Coral Houle's legacy of community building and service

ormer mayor Coral Houle has a storied legacy of community service in Bloomington and beyond. She passed away at the age of 87 at the end of October. Coral served as Bloomington's mayor from 1995-1999. Building community was a lifelong focus for Coral who joined the Bloomington Human Rights Commission in 1972, followed by terms on the Planning Commission, Housing and Redevelopment Authority, Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors and Bloomington Development Council. In 1990, Coral was appointed to fill a vacant City Council seat. She served for five years as a council member, then another five as mayor.

Coral was a trailblazer in being the first woman to serve as mayor of Bloomington and she made a lasting impact on the community that we enjoy today.

2024 Election summary **Residents vote to continue RANKED-CHOICE VOTING**

loomington voters chose to retain the City's ranked-choice **D** voting system by rejecting a city charter amendment to repeal it by 51.3% to 48.7%. This marks the second time in four years that voters have selected to continue the ranked-choice voting system for municipal elections.


Before adopting ranked-choice voting in 2020, Bloomington held a city primary in August whenever there were more than two candidates on the ballot.

WHAT'S DEVELOPING

wo major car dealerships are making investments in the community.

Bloomington Walser Toyota celebrated the completion of a new building in fall 2024. For nearly 25 years, Walser Toyota has been in Bloomington on American Boulevard. In June, Walser moved 175 corporate employees from Edina to the expanded Bloomington location, which is a combined dealership and office building. The approximately 122,000-square-foot space is now home to a total of 340 employees and more than 1,000 motor vehicle inventory parking spaces within the fourlevel parking structure. The project represents the City's efforts to encourage motor vehicle sales facilities and sites to increase density and vertical form construction.

Luther Kia Bloomington in the Penn-American District at Knox Avenue and American Boulevard West received City approval to replace its existing buildings and construct a new 59,000-square-foot dealership. The new dealership will be one story and include a showroom, offices, service and repair and car wash. The existing dealership building will remain open during construction. As part of the development, Luther Kia plans to update the streetscape with plantings, bench seating and pergolas along Knox Avenue.

CEO Start: Launch your business

Ready to advance your business idea? The City of Bloomington and Hennepin County are hosting a second CEO Start cohort March 11-May 20 in which entrepreneurs learn business fundamentals.

The first cohort of 12 participants completed the 10-week, 10-session program in April, when they pitched their business venture to an audience and connected directly with those interested in their business.

Site and Facade Improvement program offers facelifts for businesses

A ttractive neighborhood businesses are essential to boosting the local economy and enhancing the vitality of the community. To encourage revitalization, the City offers grants to businesses to improve their building facade, signage, sidewalks, patios, lighting, landscaping, murals and more.

The improvement grants cover 50% of total project costs between \$10,000-\$50,000. Grant funds must be matched one-on-one with private funds. Applications are reviewed and processed on a first-come, first-served basis until funds are exhausted. Preference is given to businesses within targeted commercial areas such as American and Portland, 98th and Nicollet, Old Cedar and Old Shakopee, Countryside Center, 90th and Penn, American and Nicollet, Central Lyndale and Amsden Ridge Center.

Real ID deadline approaching

The deadline to get a REAL IDcompliant license is May 7. When the deadline hits, Minnesotans and the rest of U.S. travelers will need a REAL ID or a federal passport to fly within the U.S.

The Department of Vehicle Services recommends people get their REAL ID or passport as soon as possible to avoid the potential of long wait times closer to the deadline. To get a REAL ID, you need a few specific documents to prove your identity. For a full list of acceptable identification documents, visit blm.mn/real-id-docs.

Did you know a passport card counts as REAL ID? The City has added additional passport appointments to accommodate residents who prefer a passport card which is valid for 10 years for anyone over the age of 16. To make a passport appointment, visit blm.mn/passports.

Since then, Scramblin' Egg has been busy working with the Minneapolis Regional Chamber to develop a plan and lay the groundwork for their transition from a food truck into a brickand-mortar space in Bloomington.

After finishing their food truck season in November, the Scramblin' Egg team became even busier renovating their new space and developing new additions to their menu, such as hashbrowns and perhaps a biscuit bowl. They hope to open for business in March.

"Everything has taken a little longer than expected," said owner Grant Veitenheimer. "It's all so new to us. We are grateful for all the support and everyone's patience as we make this transition."

EARTH ACTION HERO: THE GREEN MALL OF AMERICA

ince the 5.6-million-square-foot Mall of America opened in 1992, it has focused on sustainability. One of the most surprising features is that MOA doesn't use central heating. To maintain its 65-to-70-degree temperature range, MOA uses what's available-body heat from the 32 million annual visitors, light fixture heat and eight acres, a total of 1.2 miles of skylights.

New brain health pilot program has a successful first year

Bloomington Police accept a Regional Leaders and Innovators Award from the Minneapolis Regional Chamber

ince its launch in 2023 by the Bloomington Police Department in collaboration with Bloomington Public Health, the Bloomington Community Brain Health Services (BCBHS) program has been on a mission to serve Bloomington residents who are in crisis and post-crisis.

During a crisis, BCBHS arranges for immediate care such as appropriate emergency medical care (transport) and referrals to Hennepin County social workers. Then, as an extension of the BPD's crisis response model, BCBHS follows up with post-crisis stabilization through immediate access to mental health treatment services at no cost. BCBHS therapy services are provided by two full-time therapists and interns completing their graduate degrees in mental health. Interns are supervised by the two licensed therapists on staff.

To date, the program has served approximately 20 individuals and families, and more than 40 referrals have continued with mental health treatment. More than 130 therapy sessions have been completed by clients ranging from eight to 90 years of age, with the average age of 30 years old.

"We are very pleased with the success of the program," said Therapist Janet Yeats. "Its success has been measured by the number of individuals and families the program has served and the outpouring of support and interest. Community engagement has far surpassed our expectations and instilled significant hope for the future of this program."

UNDERSTANDING SPEED LIMIT CHANGES

In summer 2024, the City of Bloomington reduced speed limits on local streets from 30 to 25 miles per hour unless otherwise posted.

Prior to 2019, the Department of Transportation established speed limits on all roadways in Minnesota. Since then, the State Legislature has granted cities the authority to change speed limits on roads under their jurisdiction.

You may wonder why the City does not keep speed limits the same on all roads. There are many considerations for speed limits including:

• Hennepin County determines the speed limits for some

Bloomington roads.

• The role that a road serves in the transportation system.

• The risks for all users (including pedestrians and bicyclists).

• Maintaining good mobility and efficiency for the community.

Be sure to watch for new speed limit signs.



Did you know? The City offers a Safe Swap Spot

A Safe Swap Spot is a designated public location for residents to conduct transactions. Transactions may include online purchases, child custody exchanges or transactions where meeting in a public location will help improve personal safety.

Construction moving ahead at Bryant Park

The former park shelter building and playground have been removed and work continues on sanitary sewer and water lines. Over the winter, crews will be building the new park shelter and dredging the pond to improve water quality.


ARTBOX projects in the South Loop District

MOVING BLOOMINGTON FORWARD

n November 2023, Bloomington voters approved a new half-percent sales tax to provide \$155 million for the enhancement and protection of the Nine Mile Creek corridor and Moir and Central parks, the construction of a new community health and wellness center and renovations to the Bloomington Ice Garden. Here's the latest.

Work starts on Bloomington Ice Garden

The Bloomington Ice Garden renovation began in November. Upgrades include reconfiguring Rink 3 to NHL size, improvements to ticketing, security, locker rooms, restrooms, concessions and offices, as well as mechanical, roofing and ADA accessibility upgrades. High school locker rooms, an indoor training area and a mural in the vestibule will also be added.

No interruptions to BIG operations are expected as a result of the renovation until mid-March 2025 when the facility is expected to close for construction through fall 2025. For more information, visit bloomingtonforward.org/big.

NINE MILE CREEK CORRIDOR AND MOIR/CENTRAL PARK RENEWAL

Community health and wellness center: Draft design available to review next month



Continuing to meet the city's water needs

Bloomington is known for its great-tasting tap water even being named Best in Glass by the Minnesota chapter of the American Water Works Association in 2024. Providing delicious and safe tap water takes work and up-todate infrastructure.

The City's Well 7 is a future water supply well that is being designed and constructed to replace the existing Well 3, which is at the end of its useful life. In 2023, design consultants evaluated seven potential sites and determined that Tarnhill Park, 9650 Little Road, was the best site to meet all requirements.

Phase 1 of the project involves drilling the well and pumping tests. Construction on this phase will begin in summer 2025. Phase 2 includes site construction and installation of a water main to convey water to the treatment plant. Construction for phase 2 is expected to begin in 2026. When completed, Well 7 will help serve present and future water needs of the community.





Spring Break Camp now open for registration

Bloomington's new Spring Break Camp is now open to third through seventh graders for an exciting spring adventure at Moir Park, 10320 Morgan Ave. S. Campers will participate in a range of indoor and outdoor activities including disc golfing, crafts and nature walks. - To reduce site footprint and operating noise, a pitless adaptor-style well is being used.
